ROAD SAFETY SUGGESTION:

To avoid waiting at the Kauri Street intersection to turn right onto Mangorei Road, continue driving past school towards Riversdale Drive, turn left onto Miro Street then left onto Karaka Street, then use this intersection with Mangorei Road to turn right.

TEACHER PAID UNION MEETINGS

Merrilands teachers who are members of NZEI Te Riu Roa will be attending a paid union meeting on Thursday 1 July, with some attending in the morning and others in the afternoon.

The purpose of these meetings is for teachers to discuss the priorities for the renegotiation of their collective agreement in 2022. Issues being discussed, such as school staffing levels, directly impact on the education of your children. These meetings are a critical component of the negotiation process and it is the legal right of all members to attend a meeting and have their say.

While there will be some impact on the usual school programme that day, we will adjust classroom programmes to minimise disruption, and the school will remain open.

NATIONAL MONITORING STUDY

Our school is participating in the National Monitoring Study of Student Achievement (NMSSA), conducted on behalf of the Ministry of Education. They have been carrying out national monitoring in New Zealand since 1995 and the information collected is very valuable for finding out how we can improve the education our children receive.

This year the study looks at children's skills and knowledge in the arts, technology, and learning languages. A registered teacher, working for NMSSA, will come to our school on 6-8 September. All children in the study will be asked to try some written tasks. They will also fill in a questionnaire about their attitudes and learning in the three learning areas.

Some children will also take part in some group activities, and in an interview with the NMSSA teacher. The activities and interview are a chance for the children to talk about their ideas, and show what they know and can do.

A random sample group of Year 4 students will take part and consent forms and more information will come home directly to these families.

YEAR 1 & 2 TRIP - TE HENUI RIVER & PUKEWARANGI PA

The juniors recently had a wonderful trip to visit the Te Henui river and Pukewarangi pa site. We were looking at areas of importance in our local community. We were lucky to have beautiful weather and this enabled us to really enjoy our walk and make the most of looking at the river. We were able to learn about Pukewarangi pa and we could see the terraced area and pits used for cooking. As well as the amazing viewpoint for the pa.







Laura from the NP City council also came and spoke to us about pest traps in the area and what the council are doing to create a pest free area. We checked several traps with her. We then looked at the flow of water and collected samples of mini-animals to help assess the quality of the water. We looked around to find what creatures lived on and around the water. We then looked at different leaves growing on trees in the area to check the colour, shape and species which we tabled on tally charts.







We made some leaf boats and timed how fast they were moving in the water. This whole trip was a wonderful learning experience for the children to learn about Nga Awa and they really enjoyed the different activities. Our learning was enhanced by the fabulous mums and Dads who came with us and helped the children on the walk and with their learning activities.
